





### **Key Findings**

#### **March 2025**

- U.S. highway and bridge construction continues to be strong, with record levels of market activity. Leading indicators, such as state budgets and state and local government contract awards, have leveled off at record levels.
- Market growth is being supported by both the historical increase in federal-aid highway investment and several onetime state funding measures for transportation programs.
- Concrete pipe, as a share of total demand for pipe-related materials is estimated at 50% of market share in 2024. Plastic pipe is 5% of the total pipe market, metal is 12%, and the unspecified/contractor choice is 33%.
- 2024 concrete pipe market share trended upward in the Great Lakes, North Central, South Central, and Southeast regions.
- Final 2024 regional updates will be available shortly, pending final state DOT information for a few states.

#### New I-270 Mississippi River Chain of Rocks Bridge

#### **July 2022:**

The project is advertised and goes out to bid. Walsh Construction bids \$496 million and receives the contract award.

#### Sep. 2022:

Illinois DOT <u>commits \$198 million</u> in federal aid highway funds to the project.

#### March 2023 to 2025:

On-site construction work is expected to go through 2025.

As work is completed, Illinois pays Walsh Construction with state funds and requests <u>reimbursement</u> from the U.S. Treasury for the federal share of the project.

Project <u>outlays</u> from the state to the contractor and federal-aid <u>reimbursements</u> to Illinois continue until the project is complete.




#### Federal-Aid Highway Program Update Through December 31, 2024





#### US. DOT has Announced \$31.4B in Major Discretionary Grants

Value of Announced Grants by Program



- U.S. Department of Transportation (DOT) grants under the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA) account for 13% of total funding under the bill.
- Formula funds account for the remaining 87% of IIJA funding over the five-year period FY 2022 to FY 2026.
- The U.S. DOT has announced \$31.4B in highway and bridge grants under major programs.








#### **State DOT Budget Capacity Leveling Off After Major Increases**






### Leading Market Indicators at <u>Record</u> Levels: Value of State and Local Government Contract Awards






### Average Employment by Highway, Street, & Bridge Contractors Employment up 41k Since 2021






#### **Outlook for U.S. Value of Highway & Bridge Construction Activity**












### State and Local Public Sector Demand for <u>Pipe Materials</u> in Highway and Bridge Construction

Average Material Share of Drainage Pipe Demand, 2019-2023




Average Material Share of Drainage Pipe Demand, In 2024 (preliminary)








## State DOT Regional Demand for Drainage Pipe Materials Highway & Bridge Construction Projects in 2024 (preliminary)






## State DOT Regional Demand for Drainage Pipe Materials Highway & Bridge Construction Projects in 2024 (preliminary)

#### **Great Lakes Region**










## State DOT Regional Demand for Drainage Pipe Materials Highway & Bridge Construction Projects in 2024 (preliminary)

### Methodology

- Pipe and culvert materials are analyzed using state Department of Transportation bid items for the period 2012 through 2024 for 49 states, excluding Hawaii.
- Includes drainage pipe, culverts, and storm sewer pipe. Items related to cleaning, inspection, laying pipe, pipe liners, encasements, and similar items are excluded. Does not include pipe that is less than 12' in diameter.
- Contractor's choice/unspecified includes items where the pay item description does not indicate a material.
- Materials and non-standard bid items are routinely analyzed and updated, so current estimates and revisions may not match with previously published totals.
- Demand for pipe and culvert materials for local projects is estimated based on the state data and the value of local government highway and bridge contract awards.
